Speech Competition

On Thursday Dec 4th, the secondary school held their Annual Speech Competition. The competition was divided into a senior and junior category and we invited a panel of external judges to adjudicate the event.

The speakers were selected from each year group and the speeches spanned from subjects such as The Secret to Success, How to conquer our fears, Awkward Moments, Vegetarianism and many more. They were engaging and the audience made up of students and teachers were entertained and mentally stimulated.

Some statistics

For those of you who like statistics, here are some that you may find interesting.

Of the cohort of students who sat English at all levels in the Leaving Certificate of 2014, 74 % got an honour (A, B or C) in higher level paper compared to the national average of 51%. Of the students who studied the higher level 87% got an A, B, C compared to the national average of 76%

Of the cohort of students who sat Geography at all levels in the Leaving Certificate of 2014, 76 % got an honour in higher level paper compared to the national average of 59 %. Of the students who studied the higher level, 100% got an A, B, C compared to the national average of 76%

Of the cohort of students who sat Maths at all levels in the Leaving Certificate of 2014, 36 % got an honour in higher level paper compared to the national average of 20 %. Of the students who studied the higher level 75%, got an A, B, C compared to the national average of 73%
