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Anti-Bullying Week

John Scottus School had an **anti-bullying week** last September. During the week we had assemblies and workshops discussing the topic.



Through discussions it became obvious that bullying is dangerous. It can cause a lot of bad things in the victim's life and even some bullying cases it has led to suicide.

There are different types of bullying and all equally effective: **physical**, **verbal** and **cyber-bullying**. Physical bullying can be punching, kicking and ganging up on the victim. Verbal bullying is calling the victim names, using horrible strong language towards them, intentionally hurting the victim, and last, cyber bullying. Cyber bulling is now the most pervasive. The bully is **behind a screen**, most likely

sending rude and hurtful messages to the victim. Most cyber bullying cases are on **social media**, such as Twitter, Facebook and Instagram.

People have been bullied for many different reasons, some being the victim's **sexuality**, **gender**, **style of clothing**, **likes**, **dislikes**, **religion** or **race**. It is all very silly and wrong. The results of bullying are awful. Bully-

ing has led to **suicide**, **self-harm**, **anxiety** and **low self-esteem**.

I, myself really enjoyed literacy week and I hope you did too!



THE FLASH

Greg Berlanti, Andrew Kreisberg, and Geoff Johns created *The Flash* TV show. It is based in a city, called **Central City**, which is **Barry Allen's** (played by Grant Gustin) hometown. Barry is *The Flash*, a **scarlet speeder**. One day Dr. Wells (played by Tom Cavanaugh) is launching a particle-accelerator, which was about to make a major scientific breakthrough till it fails, but it does succeed in exploding and mutating a **storm** that was about to cover Central City. This same storm causes many disasters such as Barry Allen being **struck by lightning**.



When the lightning hit Barry he was hurled back into a **chemical stand** where lots of chemicals poured all over him. This mutates his genes and allows him to run with **super speed**, process events that only last a **nana-second** (while us homosapiens only have a glimpse of events that last 12 nana-seconds), he can create enough speed to **throw lightning**, he heals super quick and he has super endurance so that when he runs he doesn't just vanish or melt.

In season one we see a lot of The Flash's rogues such as *Captain Cold* & *The Pied-Piper*. In this season we are introduced to *Earth 2* and more of the Flash's rogues such as *Dr. Light & Zoom*. We are also introduced to some new allies such as *Jay Garrick & Jefferson Jacks*, In season two Zoom is the new threat, speed has devoured him and all he wants is to be the only speedster and getting faster no matter what. He sends **meta humans** after Barry (humans which the particle accelerator has given powers to such as Flash and Zoom). The Flash is **only one** of the many speedsters.

In season two Zoom has stolen Jay Garrick's speed and he was about to kill him until the portal opened bringing Jay to *Earth 1*. He tries to warn Barry on what he's up against but Barry does not listen. He uses his **ex-girlfriend as bait** but it doesn't work, After Zoom takes her as a hostage and turns the tables using her as bait, Barry tries to stop him but ends up getting beaten. *Gorilla Grodd* has also returned to season two; Grodd is a gorilla with psychic powers, super strength and speed.
